#### Methodology

- Hart Research conducted a survey of 800 voters of color aged 18 to 44 in key presidential battleground states: Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin.
- Interviews were conducted October 11-15.
- The sample includes interviews with 307 young Black voters, 295 young Latinx voters, 162 young AAPI voters, and 36 young Native American voters (the Native American sample is too small to provide reliable results).
- The margin of error on results from the full sample is +/-3.9 percentage points, and larger for subgroups.

# Key Findings - Abortion



- **High Support for Legal Abortion**: A large majority of young voters of color across the board (from 67% of Latinx voters to 72% of AAPI voters) express strong support, believing that abortion should be legal in all or most cases.
- Serious concerns about future access to abortion: In the wake of the Supreme Court's decision overturning Roe v. Wade, young voters are much more concerned by a significant margin about states making it too difficult to get an abortion (ranging from +31 for Latinx voters to +39 for AAPI voters).
- Strong preference for an abortion rights President: Over 70% of respondents indicated they would be more likely to support a candidate who champions abortion rights.

# Key Issue - Racial Inequality



- Widespread Concern About Racial Inequality: A large majority of young voters of color indicate that racial inequality is a very important issue in their voting decisions, including 74% of young Black voters.
- **Generational Differences in Perspectives**: Among Gen Z voters (age 18-27) there is a heightened awareness and concern about racial inequality, with 80% considering racial inequality a top issue (compared to 60% of millennials).
- Overwhelming support for a President to address racial inequality: By huge margins, young voters of color find it at least somewhat important to elect a Presidential candidate who will work to reduce racial inequality, ranging from +69 for AAPI voters to +79 for Black voters.

# Key Findings - Climate



- **High Concern on Climate Change Among Young Voters of Color**: A significant majority of young voters of color express strong concern about climate change, from 76% of AAPI voters to 88% of Black respondents identifying it as an important issue in their voting decisions.
- **Broad Support for Climate Action Policies**: Young voters overwhelmingly support robust climate action, with support for more Federal action ranging from a +33 margin for Latinx voters to a +46 margin for AAPI voters. This consensus underscores that candidates should prioritize environmental sustainability and climate justice in their platforms, as these issues are seen as directly impacting their communities.
- **Generational Disparities in Awareness**: There is a marked generational divide regarding climate change awareness and concern among Gen Z voters, 82% consider climate change a top priority, compared to 63% of millennials.

# Key Findings - Immigration



- Strong support for immigration overall: Young voters of color in swing states still are strongly supportive of immigration overall, ranking from a 15-point differential for Black voters to a full 35-point differential for AAPI voters.
- **Generational differences**: GenZ participants showed more support for increased immigration compared to millennials (+8), indicating broader support for immigration amongst younger voters.
- Young voters want a balanced approach: Young voters of color consistently support a balanced approach (border security and a path to citizenship) instead of a punitive, "border wall" approach (ranging from +25 for Latinx voters to +31 for Black voters)

# Key Findings - TikTok Ban



- **Broad opposition to a TikTok Ban**: A strong majority (53%) of young voters of color across the board oppose banning TikTok, compared to only 34% support such a ban. This is across the board (ranging from +12 for AAPI voters to +23 for Black voters)
- Young Voters Overwhelmingly Support TikTok's Continued Operation: A full two-thirds (66%) of young voters of color want the next president to find a compromise that allows TikTok to continue operating in the U.S., while only 24% support allowing the platform to be shut down. This is especially true among Black voters (68% support keeping TikTok operational).
- Importance of supporting a pro-TikTok Presidential candidates: A significantly higher number of young voters of color (+28) support a Presidential candidate who promises to keep TikTok operational. The importance of this is highest for Black male voters, where 33% more voters say they are more likely to vote for a candidate that seeks to ensure TikTok can keep operating.

# Key Findings - Latinx Voters



- Qualified support for Kamala Harris: Our data indicates that young Latinx voters in battleground states continue to be supportive of Kamala Harris over Donald Trump for President, by a 61-34% margin. This is in line with other, broader surveys marking Harris' support among Latino voters at approximately 61% to 66% (Pew Research Center, AS/COA)
- Key issues for young Latinx voters: Young Latinx voters say the economy (81%), healthcare (67%), abortion (57%) and democracy (57%) are very important issues influencing their vote.
- **Support on abortion increases**: Two-thirds (67%) of young Latinx voters support the legality of abortion in all or most cases, and they disapprove of the Supreme Court overturning *Roe* by 53% to 37%.
- Race still important to young Latinx voters: While some commentators have argued that Latinx voters are less motivated by race, our survey found that a large majority (73%) still experience racism and an overwhelming number (80%) say it is important to elect a presidential candidate who will work to reduce racial inequality.

# Key Findings - Black Voters



- **Strong Support for Kamala Harris**: A remarkable 83% majority of young Black voters in battleground states support the Democratic nominee, and 81% have a positive view of Kamala Harris. Among those who support Donald Trump, fully 44% are still open to changing their mind.
- Black voters are ready to vote. An overwhelming 81% of young Black voters in battleground districts say they will definitely vote.
- Key issues for Black voters: For these young Black voters, the economy (81%), health care (78%), and racial inequality (74%) rate as very important issues. Majorities also say that democracy, gun policy, and abortion are very important. A full 88% believe it is important to elect a president who will address racial inequality.
- Support for immigration: Contrary to the notion that Black voters are against immigration, these young Black voters believe that immigration helps the United States (48% to 33%) and that a balanced approach on immigration is preferable to a punitive one (62% to 30%).
- **Support for legal abortion**: Young Black voters are strongly in support of legal abortion, with 71% believing that abortion should be legal in all or most cases and a strong majority concerned that states were restricting access too much (65%-27%).

# Key Findings - AAPI Voters



- **High support for Kamala Harris**: AAPI youth voters are significantly more inclined to vote for Kamala Harris than Donald Trump in the 2024 election, with a notable 30-point gap: 63% of AAPI youth say they are voting for Harris vs. 33% for Trump. These results reflect a similar alignment as in 2020, when a solid majority of AAPI voters supported Biden in battleground states.
- **Key issues influencing vote:** Like other young voters of color, AAPI youth voters prioritize the economy (78%), healthcare (71%), and abortion (57%) as very important factors in deciding their vote this year.
- Worsening economic condition: A significant proportion of young AAPI voters view both the national and their personal economic situations negatively, with 74% rating the national economy and 68% rating their personal situation as only fair or poor.
- **Positive on immigration:** AAPI voters view immigration as a net positive for the country, even more so than their Black and Latino counterparts. Fully 61% of AAPI voters believe that immigration overall helps the US more than it hurts, and 60% favor a balanced approach to immigration policy rather than a punitive approach.
- **Abortion access:** A large majority of AAPI voters support legal access to abortion, with 72% believing it should be legal in all or most cases.
